The World Habitat Awards were established in 1985 by the Building and Social Housing Foundation (BSHF) as part of its contribution to the United Nations International Year of Shelter for the Homeless.

Projects are sought that:

- demonstrate practical, innovative and sustainable solutions to current housing issues faced by countries all around the world;
- can be transferred or adapted for use as appropriate;
- are already being implemented or are completed i.e. not at design or very early stages of development;
- view the term habitat from a broad perspective and bring other benefits as well, such as energy or water saving, income generation, social inclusion, community and individual empowerment, health benefits, capacity building or education.

The competition is open to any individual, organisation or government agency that has an innovative and sustainable housing solution in any country of the world. Awards of £10,000 and a trophy will be presented to each of the two winners of the 2016/17 World Habitat Awards at the UN-Habitat Governing Council in 2017.
